Host Organization

The ICP International Summer Academy History

The first international ICP Summer Academy took place in July 2008 in Berne. It was centered on methods of conflict transformation and peacebuilding and their application in various professional contexts. The annual theme of the 2nd Summer Academy in July 2009 was “Conflict and Culture”. In 2010, the Academy focused on Political Means for Non-Violent Conflict Transformation, and in 2011, we discussed aspects of Project Management and Evaluation in the Field of Peacebuilding. For the first time in 2012, we approached conflict transformation from a geographical and political perspective under the main theme of the Arab Uprisings. In 2013, we focused on the peace processes and mediation in the South Caucasus Region, particularly in Armenia and Azerbaijan. The 2014 edition, titled “Peace Mediation: From Conflict to Cooperation”, offered its participants a complete overview of the

methods and approaches to conflict transformation and a broad range of tools for mediation. The event has triggered great interest – approximately 40 people participate in our Summer Academy every year. The evaluation results show that participants have been particularly satisfied with the quality of contents and the professional competence of the lecturers and workshop instructors. The participants could take advantage of the Summer Academy on a personal and a professional level and appreciated its theory- and practice-oriented approach. Evaluation results also show that the event is a useful platform for networking and meeting like-minded people from different professional and academic fields.

The ICP International Summer Academy and Forum 2015

With the theme “North Africa and Sahel”, the International Summer Academy and Forum 2015 offers its participants an overview of mediation and dialogue within the North Africa and Sahel region. Focusing on a geographical area is relevant in order to learn how to develop useful approaches for that specific region. It provides the participants with the possibility to discuss real cases that arise in North Africa and Sahel, and the opportunity to observe how local initiatives and the indigenous culture of peace mediation interact with initiatives from outsiders. Conflicts are often related to governance issues and, more in general, to socio-political matters. Culture plays an extremely important role impacting people’s values and visions of what the social and political system should be. The mediator needs to address culturally and socially related root causes of conflict. The idea behind this regional focus is hence to determine which mediation and dialogue approaches are efficient in that particular region, and which are less so.

As a constructive approach to peacefully transform violent conflicts into cooperation, the importance of peace mediation has significantly increased over recent years. Peace mediation aims at preventing or solving violent conflicts by conducting dialogue and negotiations. This way, peace mediators assist the different parties involved to overcome the burden of the conflict and guide them towards constructive, cooperative solutions for a peaceful and common future. The art of peace mediation requires patience and perseverance, as well as skills, knowledge, methodology and experience.

Interactive and participatory methods are particularly emphasized during the course, as they allow participants to fully practice what they learn, as well as sharing their knowledge and skills with other participants. Participants will have the opportunity to gain first-hand insights from international and local experts during the lectures. The workshops and mediation

simulations will allow them to play the mediator role and thus improve their practical skills of conflict transformation. Additionally, the Summer Academy and Forum is an excellent place to increase one's personal and professional network in the cozy atmosphere of the Caux Palace Hotel.

The International Peace-Builders' Forum

Coupled with the ICP International Summer Academy, the International Peace-Builders' Forum (IPF) will be held around the theme "International Peace-Builders' Forum: "Non-violent Conflict Transformation: Dignity, Inclusion and Participation", on 16 – 19 July 2015 in Caux (Montreux), Switzerland. The IPF is a unique and publicly accessible opportunity for participants to physically meet and connect with experts and specialists of the international field of peace-building. The IPF expects around 200 participants. This includes 40 exhibitors with two delegates per organization and 120 participants.



The IPF is a perfect opportunity for participants in the Summer Academy to complete their knowledge of peace mediation.

Learning Approach

In 2015, the ICP Summer Academy became a Summer Academy and Forum. As a consequence of this new learning approach, experts and lecturers on the one hand, and participants on the other hand, are considered equally valuable in their contributions and inputs on peace mediation and dialogue. Both experts' and participants' interventions allow the entire group to assemble more knowledge and develop more creative ideas. The benefits of this common-learning approach are invaluable.

In order to perpetuate the group dynamics that takes place during the International Summer Academy and Forum and to keep alive this experts' network, we strongly encourage the participants to come back next year to reinforce the expertise of the network.

Learning Objectives

- Participants learn key elements about the dynamics of the North African and Sahel regions from a conflict transformation perspective;
- Participants learn about the processes of conflict mediation and about the concepts, definitions and theories mobilized in these processes. They will examine and debate methods and approaches of conflict transformation and peacebuilding;
- Participants acquire practical skills and applicable knowledge in the field of conflict transformation and peacebuilding projects through a mediation simulation;
- The ICP International Academy and Forum is an open, interactive forum. Particular attention is paid to the exchange between the speakers, experts and participants.
- Participants have the possibility to exchange and present their own projects and cases. After their presentations, they will benefit from an interactive discussion with the group and from experts' feedback on their case.
- The ICP International Academy and Forum is an international platform for the peace, mediation and counseling scene and it contributes in paving the way for networking and future cooperation projects. Participants will be able to stay in touch with the community via our LinkedIn groups.
- The organizers are sensitive to the different cultural backgrounds, concepts and experiences of the participants; therefore the intercultural exchange is an integral part of the Summer Academy.

Language

Fluent English is required. Presentations, workshops and simulations will be held in that language.

Location

Looking out over Lake Geneva from an altitude of 1000 meters, the Caux centre can accommodate up to 450 people. Formerly the Caux-Palace Hotel, it became in 1946 an international meeting place, thanks to the generous contributions in time, talent and money of many volunteers.

Most bedrooms have a bathroom or shower and two beds. Bedrooms can be reached directly by phone; there is no radio or TV. There is an Internet room available for a small fee and some public parts of the building are equipped with a wireless internet access. In Caux,

Organizational Issues

How to get there

Participants arriving by plane will most probably arrive at Geneva International Airport. From there, there is a 2-hours journey to Caux by train. As the place is situated on the mountains, you first have to take a train that goes along the shoreline of Lake Geneva until Montreux and, second, you have to take a small train that goes up the hill to Caux. If you are coming from a different destination, just make sure you get to Montreux and change the train there. The train from Montreux to Caux only runs once an hour, so check the timetable to be sure you get it.

Once you get to Caux, the Conference Center is situated just across the street. It is a huge castle-like hotel. You cannot miss it!

Forum

Monday, July 20th, afternoon

The United Nations Approach to Mediation

Luca Willig

Academy

Monday, July 20th, afternoon

Luca Willig is an Associate Political Affairs Officer within the Mediation Support Unit (MSU) at the UN Department of Political Affairs. As a team member of the UN Mediation Support Unit (MSU), Mr. Willig provides technical support to mediation and dialogue processes, focusing on Central and West Africa. Prior to joining MSU in 2014, he supported the senior management of Médecins Sans Frontières Switzerland (MSF) on institutional issues, external relations, and crisis management. From 2009 to 2012, Mr. Willig carried out assignments for the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) in the Central African Republic and in Afghanistan, working on protection and assistance activities and negotiations with conflict parties.

This lecture will introduce participants to the United Nations approach to mediation. After proposing a definition of mediation, the presentation will focus on the key fundamentals of the United Nations Guidance for Effective Mediation (preparedness; consent; impartiality; inclusivity; national ownership; international law and normative frameworks; coherence, coordination and complementarity; quality peace agreements) and discuss the links between

these fundamentals. A brief overview of the resources available to UN mediation efforts will also be provided.

Participants' debriefing

Forum

Every morning, 9:00 to 9:30am

Every morning, participants will share their perspective on the previous day's inputs with the rest of the groups, and explain to each other how and to what extent these inputs will impact their understanding and practice of mediation. It is an open discussion during which exchange among participants is encouraged and necessary to augment the quantity and quality of creative ideas for the whole group.

Dealing with conflict in North Africa and Sahel

Abbas Aroua

Academy

Tuesday, July 21st, morning

Abbas Aroua is an Algerian medical and health physicist. He is also human rights defender, peace worker and political activist. He is Adjunct Professor at the Faculty of Biology and Medicine of the Lausanne University, and the founder in 2002 and director of the Cordoba Foundation of Geneva (CFG) for peace promotion. He authored and edited numerous reports, scientific papers and books in the fields of conflict resolution, human development, and public health.

The Cordoba Foundation of Geneva (CFG) has been conducting, for several years, peace promotion programmes in North Africa, West Asia and the Sahel. It addressed particularly the challenges of democratic transitions in the countries concerned by the "Arab Spring", as well as the impact of the social and political transformations occurring in North Africa on the neighbouring Sahel region. The main lines of tensions and issues of polarisation encountered in these geographic and cultural spaces will be presented and the ways and means to address them will be discussed. A particular focus will be on what is perceived as "difficult actors" and how to approach them and to include them in the peace processes.

Mediation cases presented by the participants: inputs and experience. Peer supervision and coaching

Forum

Tuesday July 21st, afternoon

Some participants agreed, upon registration, to present their own cases, projects or experience to the whole group. They describe and explain their case to the audience, then open the discussion on questions that arise on their case. Presenters benefit from peer support and coaching from the experts of the Summer Academy and Forum.

Nohad Chebaro

Wednesday, July 22nd, morning

Nohad Chebaro is Initiative Coordinator at the Eastern Libya Delegate at the Humanitarian Dialogue Centre. Graduated in Sociology from the University of St Joseph in Beirut, Lebanon. Graduated in Rehabilitation and Physiotherapy from the Facolta of Medicina in Milano, Italy. 35 years work experiences in Humanitarian Field; Assistant at the ICRC mission in Lebanon (civil war in 1975) for Protection and Aid; Head of International Relations at the Libyan Red Crescent Society for capacity building of the LRCs with the ICRC and IFRCC in Libya; Executive Assistant Head of Mission of International Committee of the Red Cross Mission Libya, Protection (refugees and IDP's) Cooperation with the Libyan Red Crescent Society in Benghazi and East Libya.

The lecture will be divided in two parts:

1. How to use and work with the local traditional mediators: the Hukamaa (the Wise) of Sheikh of Tribe (Sheikh ashira). We are going to explore the role of these local mediators on National reconciliation, as well as how they can become influential actors and have a positive

impact on conflict drivers and politicians, in favor of a cessation of hostilities and to reach a ceasefire agreement. We will also analyze their role on Peace keeping. We will study the role of the Hukamaa in Libya, based on the actual conflict situation.

2. Aftermath of conflicts: How the women (mother or sister or wife of the fighters) can play a role in preparing a peaceful coexistence and Peace keeping. We will further explore some initiatives experienced in Libya.

Approche politique de la Médiation : le cas de la Francophonie A Political Approach to Mediation: the IOF's Case

Sandra Coulibaly Leroy holds the position of Assistant Director in charge of foresight and strategic intelligence programs for the International Organization of the Francophonie (OIF). From 2012 to 2014, she served as the Deputy Director for cultural development and diversity programs for the same Organization. Prior to that, for twelve years, she was posted as Deputy Permanent Representative of the IOF to the United Nation Office in Geneva dealing with human rights issues, especially the UPR process. During this period, she has undertaken and implemented the IOF's diplomatic actions inside the UN organization. In 2007, she has contributed to the venue of the 1st seminar on the francophone mediation which has been hosted in the center for security and peace in Geneva gathering high level personalities from the francophone areas and beyond (international/regional organizations) and mediation practitioners.

She holds several postgraduate qualifications in the field of international relations focusing on intercultural relations, communication and new technologies from several French universities. Sandra Coulibaly also completed an Executive Master in international negotiation and policy from the Graduate Institute of International Studies in Geneva (IHEID). She is a lecturer teacher at the Art and Communication schools of Paris.

Le temps récent a été marqué par l'émergence et le développement de crises et de conflits protéiformes dans l'espace francophone qui permettent de considérer celui-ci comme un laboratoire de la diversité en matière d'analyse de situations, de modalités d'intervention et de possibilités d'accompagnement.

On constate ainsi de nouvelles dynamiques et de nouveaux acteurs apparaissant dans le cadre de situation complexes. Ces dernières, parfois héritées du passé, ou bien inédites, rappellent leur spécificité, s'inscrivant dans un champ culturel particulier. Elles génèrent de nouvelles dynamiques, notamment par l'usage des médias sociaux, qui illustrent souvent des enjeux géopolitiques qui invalident la qualification d' « internalité » de ces conflits. C'est dans cet environnement mouvant que la Francophonie a tenté au fil des années de bâtir une approche qui lui est propre, tant par la doctrine que par la pratique, convaincue « de l'importance de la médiation internationale dans la prévention et le règlement pacifique des conflits ».

De la Tunisie, en passant par le Mali et tout récemment le Burundi, ces situations illustrent les défis protéiformes qu'une Organisation telle que l'OIF tente de relever, en termes de moyens, de pratiques et de légitimité. Cette communication abordera principalement les points suivants :

- Spécificité de l'approche francophone de la médiation : doctrine et pratique
- Médiation/facilitation politique : examen de cas pays

Recent times have been characterized by the emergence and development of different types of crisis and conflicts in the Francophone space which can be considered as a laboratory of diversity in terms of analysis of situations, conditions of interventions and support capabilities.

New dynamics, new actors that appear as part of sometimes complex situations inherited from the past, or completely new recall us about the specificity of each situation, belonging to a particular cultural environment , generating new processes. These cases often illustrate geopolitical issues that invalidate the qualification of "internal" conflicts. Considering this changing environment, the IOF has tried over the years to build its own approach, both in doctrine and in practice, convinced in " the importance of international mediation in the prevention and peaceful resolution of conflicts "

From the Tunisian spring to Mali and more recently Burundi, these situations illustrate the multifaceted challenges that an organization such as the OIF in terms of resources, practices or legitimacy are trying to meet. This communication primarily shall address the following issues:

- *Specificity of the Francophone approach to mediation: doctrine and practice*
- *Mediation / facilitation policy: country's case review*

Building peace in the Sahel region: learning from the Malian peace process

Pierre-Yves Monette (Belgium - Natural Resources; Constitutions; Mediation, Dialogue and Facilitation Process Design) has provided mediation expertise to the United Nations since 2010 in different capacities, including as a member of the Standby Team, notably in the Central African Republic (CAR), Chad, Mali and the Maldives. In CAR, he coached and assisted the National Mediator in the 2011 ceasefire process between the government and the main rebel groups; he then negotiated and co-drafted the 2013 Constitutional Charter of the Transition. In Mali, he was sent to help the MINUSMA to support the implementation of the 2013 Ouagadougou Agreement and to support the Algerian-led peace talks in 2014-15. He was the Federal Mediator of his country (Belgium) between 1997 and 2005. Between 2007 and 2011, he led the European Federation of Water and Sanitation, which gathered the vast majority of public, private and mixed water industries and services of Europe. In that capacity, he was active in addressing water-related conflicts in the Middle East and Europe. Mr. Monette was also the 2nd laureate for the position of European Mediator (elected by the European Parliament) in 2010, and is the honorary Counsellor to the Belgian Head of State (King Philippe I). He speaks French, English, Spanish and Dutch.

The Sahel region has – finally – gained its place on the top of the international community's agenda. I will start my lecture by drawing a picture of why this is so, and of what the global challenges the Sahel region and the world are facing there.

I will then raise an issue regarding the resolution of international conflicts that seems particularly applicable to the ones in the Sahel region: indeed, many of the peace processes the international community is dealing with officially through a mediation are actually pure diplomatic exercises, which answer to very few mediation rules and parameters. I will try to answer the why and the how of this reality.

Next, I will present an overview of the inter-Malian peace process started in 2013 and culminated with the signature of the Peace and Reconciliation Agreement, following 11-month long talks in Algiers, and I will analyse this process, the parties involved, the solutions found and the next steps that will follow the Agreement.

On basis of this analysis and of my personal experience in conflict resolution in the Sahel region (Mali, Burkina Faso and Chad), I will finally try to draw some conclusions and present useful approaches to broker peace in the Sahel region.

Mediation simulation

The mediation simulation allows participants to put their knowledge and skills in peace mediation in practice. In the form of a supervised role-play, the simulation is an efficient way of gathering experience and enhancing one's abilities in the field of peace mediation and dialogue.

An Agenda for Peace in Mali – A Dialogue Process toward internally driven change

Jean-Simon Rioux

Friday, July 24th, morning

Jean-Simon Rioux joined Interpeace in 2013. He holds a master degree from Sciences-Po Paris. Prior to his work with Interpeace, he worked with the Africa Fragile State, Conflict and Social Development (AFCTS) Department of the World Bank as a Conflict and Stabilization Analyst on the Sahel region. He also collaborated with International Crisis Group (ICG) Africa Project.

The lecture will explore Interpeace methodology and process (Dialogue based on Inclusivity and Participation, Trust building, reduction of Horizontal Distances; Participatory Action-Research (PAR); Reduction/Compression of Vertical distances (Track 6 Approach)), namely through its current programme in Mali. It will then go further in what is emerging from the

process, and lessons than can be learned from it, both in terms of process and of content for other actors involved in Mali and in the Sahel region. By doing so, a particular emphasis will be put on the differences between external and internal (or local) analyses of the situation, and the necessary deconstruction of some dominant narratives/analyses.

Peace Mediation and Dialogue café

Forum

Friday, July 24th, afternoon

The Peace Mediation and Dialogue café is a participatory teaching method. The functioning of the Peace Mediation and Dialogue café is quite similar to the one of workshops. Its goal is to provide an open and creative conversation on topics of mutual interest. It is organized in a way that fosters novel ideas and helps gather interesting insights on the given topics. Every participant in the Peace Mediation and Dialogue café shares knowledge, skills and perspectives, so that in the end, everyone benefits from the common knowledge and creativity of the group.

Workshops can be proposed and facilitated by participants.
